RULE CLARIFICATION

RECORDABLE SCORES

Since the introduction of the new 1st January Rules, myself and indeed many State Rules Supervisors, Handicappers and Executive members have had many questions relating to events that are NOT recordable on Record Cards.

In an attempt to clarify this, below is a list of events that are NOT to be recorded on cards.

This may not be a complete list, as it seems that nearly everyday someone questions the validity of recording different event scores on cards.

Generally these events can be described as NOVELTY and as such are NOT recordable and therefore do not fit the criteria for the recognition of Break Badges or Long Run Breaks.

NOVELTY EVENTS – *These events are not listed as events in the Rule book*

- * Single Barrel Handicap
- * Double Rise off any mark other than 15 metres
- * Events where extreme angles have been set, for example where target angles may be set as wide as 45 degrees
- * Silent Rise

- * Events shot from metreages less than 15, for example from 11 – 14 metres
- * Reverse Points this is where 2 points are given for a first barrel hit and 3 points for the second barrel
- * Events that use Midi or Mini targets
- * Events requiring the compulsory use of side x side shotguns
- * Grouped metreage Handicap Rule 2.02(h) these can only be shot as a novelty
- * Skeet Super Handicaps, this is where handicaps other than those designated under ACTA grading rules are allocated to those shooters using alternate sub-gauge guns
- * Lineal (walk through) Sporting events

RULE BOOK EVENTS – these events are also not recordable

- * Walk-up
- * Deauville Doubles
- * Graded metreage events as per Rule 2.01(b)(ii)
